Governor's Grave Warning.

A Renter's despatch from Bombay yesterday states:—Speaking in the Legislative Council at Poona, Sir George Sydenham-Clark, Governor of Bombay, said the Government was confronted by a deliberate organisation for the purpose of indiscriminate murder. The saddest feature of the new situation was the fact that men were to be found who were prepared to incite a train of half-educated youths to the most dastardly crimes. A section of writers and speakers in the Bombay Presidency were seeking to stir up race hatred leading to violence, and it could not be told how far their teachings had penetrated. The employment of force against a misguided people was hateful, but the Government could not sit down with folded arms. In conclusion the Governor declared the anarchist methods which had been adopted were indignantly repudiated by all true-hearted Indians.

FATAL BURNING ACCIDENT.

Little Girl the Victim.

A little girl named Esther Blackwell, of Mary street, was admitted to Barrington's Hospital on Sunday evening suffering from severe burns to the face. It appears that she lit a match and accidentally set fire to her dress, resulting in the injuries stated. During the night she suffered much, and this morning at 11 o'clock she succumbed to her injuries. An inquest was not deemed necessary.
