DEATH OF A GREAT RUSSIAN COMPOSER.

One of the celebrated Russian composers, Korsakoff, has just taken place in St. Petersburg. He had done much for Russian music, but years he had fallen on evil days. GLASS-BOTTOMED BOATS.
