IRISH EMIGRATION STATISTICS.

Emigration returns for the first six months of the year showed that compared with the corresponding period last year there is a decrease in the number of emigrants. The total number of emigrants is a decrease of 8,713, in comparison with the number leaving from Leinster from Munster, 3,762, from Ulster, 3,270. America was the destination of 9,974 of the emigrants, and 1,000 for Canada.

ESCAPE FROM PRISON RECALLED.

Some years ago a sensation was created by the escape of a prisoner named Moroney, from the Mill Prison. He was a young man of daring disposition, and declared to the warden that he would get out. How he did it is somewhat of a mystery, as the prison is about 40 feet high. Police and prison guards searched the country in all directions, but in vain, and the matter passed out of their minds until yesterday, when it was discovered that Moroney had been arrested in London and an escort of Royal Irish Constabulary proceeded across Channel to convey him to Mill Prison.

THE DEIL'S IN DUBLIN CITY.

Mr. Birrell's jocosely observation in debate in committee on the Irish University Bill, that they all knew there were devils in Dublin City, was, of course, founded, probably unconsciously, on Burn's well-known line, "Tis true as that the deil's in Hell or Dublin city." It is not, however, so generally known, says the "Law Times," that the line itself alludes to the old Four Courts in Dublin, which before 1796 were the seat of justice. The hall of the Four Courts was not then the tubular vestibule now known by that name in Dublin. The old Four Courts stood adjacent to Christ Church Cathedral; its hall was crowned by an octagonal cupola, was very long and narrow, and entered by a door leading from a lane, over whose entrance was an image of Satan, and known as "Hell." When the courts were removed, the wicked image came down, and was converted into snuffboxes, while the head and horns became the coveted property of a Dublin antiquary, and are probably still extant.

ATTEMPT TO WRECK AN EXPRESS.

Mr. Justice Bingham passed sentence of twelve months' Bristol treatment, at Newcastle Assizes upon a youth named Reginald Tweedy,

IRISH LANDS.

Statement of Amount.

In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Hobhouse, answering Mr. Balfour, the total amount of Guaranteed National Debt Commission's issue of £5,000,000 was £28,201,400. National Debt Commission's issue of savings Banks funds, £1,197,000, which amount will be the proceeds of the new issue in accordance with Section 20 of the Act, 1903. The Chief Secretary regards the third part of the guaranteed National Debt Commission's issue in the case of direct sales, £1,013,857, of which £272,240 advanced to-morrow, and the remainder as outstanding questions have of Under Sections 6, 7, and 8 of the Land Act, 1903, the Commission to buy estates, the purchase amount to £675,766. Of this sum £228,201,444 stock produced in or a deficiency when compared with this last sum £3,020,463 good by an annuity of £1,000,000 chargeable on the Ireland Development and the balance of £318,684 charged on the votes in respect of Purchase Aid Fund. Since 1st January the interest received on the Irish Land Commission's Fund in respect of tenants' purchase and temporary investments has been the interest paid on the stock borrowings by £161,092, of which £100,000 charged against the £200,000 grant under section 33 of the Act, and £50,000 has been received from the fund.
