DEATH OF MR. C. PELLY, J. P.

The death is announced at an advanced age of Mr. Cornelius Pelly, J.P., who was well-known throughout Ireland as an auditor of the Local Government Board, a position which he held for over a quarter of a century. He retired on pension five or six years ago, and his death took place on Tuesday at his residence, Edwell, Lansdowne road, aged 80 years. He was a member of the Loan Fund Board of Ireland and a magistrate for the County of Dublin.

The deceased gentleman was son-in-law of the late Dr. O'Shaughnessy, J.P., of this city.

SECOND DAY.

The concluding day of Limerick Regatta associated with unfavourable weather. Throughout the morning there were frequent showers but by the time the boats were on their way to the stake-posts for the opening event, the mists cleared somewhat, and a promise of a fair afternoon presented itself. About an hour later, however, the sky again became overcast and from this to the close of the proceedings a thick, disagreeable drizzle descended, with the result that the boats were scarcely recognizable until well at this side of Barrington's Pier. Despite this rather discomforting feature the attendance in the enclosure along the river banks was of considerable proportions, but not so large as on the previous day, when the crowds were phenomenal. A redeeming feature yesterday as compared with Tuesday was the absence of that strong south-west breeze which perturbed the water and somewhat militated against good rowing. The river bore a tranquil appearance for the first time which invariably furnished capital finishes, and compensated for the adverse climatic conditions.
