### THE LATE SIR JOHN BANKS.

#### Distinguished Ennis Man.

The late Sir John Banks, M.D., who passed away in Dublin on Thursday at an advanced age, was son of the late Dr. Percival Banks, Ennis. He was M.D. of the University of Dublin; D Sc (Honoris Causa), and was knighted in 1889. He was Physician in Ordinary to the late Queen, and also to the present King. For many years he occupied the chair of Regins Professor of Medicine in Trinity College resigning in 1898. He had also been a member of the Senate of the Boyal University, and filled the positions of President of the Royal College of Surgeons and of the British Medical Association, while he was first President of the Royal Academy of Medicine in Ireland. He was a D.L., and J.P., of the Co. Monaghau, of which he was High Sheriff in 1891. Sir John had one daughter, Sheriff in 1891. who married the fourth Baron Gwydyr. She died in 1898.
