General's Report.

The annual death-rate represented by the red last week in the Dublin Registrar's office the twenty-one principal provincial parts of Ireland was 14.6 per 1,000 of their population, which, for the purposes of comparison, is estimated at 1,181,959. The deaths during each of the past four weeks, and during that period, in the several districts, when arranged, corresponded to the following rates per 1,000. In some instances, deaths not having been registered within the week in which they occurred, the rates do not represent the weekly mortality: Armagh, 24.6; Londonderry, 4.8; Belfast, 12.1; Clonmel, 15.4; Cork, 10.3; Galway, 8.2; Dublin Reg. Area, 16.8; Drogheda, 8.0; Galway, 23.3; Kilkenny, 9.8; Londonderry, 13.7; Lisburn, 22.7; Londonderry, 14.6; Newry, 25.2; Newtownards, 17.2; Queenstown, 19.8; Sligo, 9.6; Waterford, 17.5; Wexford, 18.7. The number of certain epidemic diseases registered in the two districts during last week were equal to the rate of 1.8 per 1,000, the rates varying in seventeen of the districts to 10.3 in the 3 deaths from all causes registered in the district including one from enteric fever. In the 88 deaths from all causes registered in the district are 9 from diarrhoeal diseases. One of the deaths from all causes registered in Cork is from enteric fever. The 12 deaths from all causes for Kerry include 2 from diarrhoeal diseases. One of the 10 deaths registered for Limerick is from enteric fever, and one death from this disease is also registered in the 6 deaths from all causes registered in the district. One of the two deaths registered for Wexford 2 are from diarrhoeal diseases, and one of the 2 deaths registered for Sligo is from enteric fever.
