

THE LICENSING LAWS.

John McMahon, publican, Henry street, was prosecuted for a breach of the Sunday Closing Act on the 26th ult.

The evidence in support of the charge was that the publican was seen by Sergeant McCormack standing at his door on Sunday morning, and shortly afterwards a man named Michael Madigan come out and went down the street. The Sergeant followed him and charged him with being in the house during prohibited hours. He denied that he was and added that he was only speaking to Mr. McMahon at the door. The defence was a positive denial of Madigan

being in the house, the only occupant at the time

The Bench was convinced that the statute had been violated, and imposed a fine of 20s. on the publican and 2s. 6d. on Madigan.

Mr. Kelly, solr., represented the defendants. Patrick O'Connell, Henry street, was also charged with yiolating the licensing laws on the

Mr. Kelly, soir., for the defence, admitted a technical breach of the Act. excursion from Limerick on that day, and a young fellow living in the town slipped in unknown to the publican. He was not supplied with drink and left the premises when the police entered. Under the circumstances the police might withdraw the prosecution.

District Inspector McNally declined to accode to the application, and after evidence had been given the magistrates ordered the publican to forfeit a fine of 20s., and a nominal penalty of a penny was inflicted on the non-bons fide.

John O'Dea, publican, Vandeleur street, was also charged with a breach of the Licensing Act on the 2ad. Two men named Brew and Shea, who live within the three mile limit, were summoned for being on the premises, also Michael O'Connell, who lives in the town.

Mr. Kelly, solicitor for the publican, said the latter was under a misapprehension as to the distance Brew and Shea lived from the town. He was of opinion that they resided beyond the prescribed limit, and on the day in question had come to bown to see a lady who was after return. from America. As to the presence of O'Connell on the premises until the police arrived, the publican was not aware that he was there. He had found an entrance by the back
