KILLED BY A SCYTHE.

Tragic Accident near Tallow.

On Friday evening, while a young man
named Timothy Connor, aged 19 years, son of
Mr. Patrick Connery, Maunehill, Tallow, Co.
Waterford, was engaged cutting corn in a field

victim of an accident, which unfortunately
proved fatal. It appears the young man found
it necessary to sharpen his scythe and while so
engaged the point of the blade accidentally
slipped, striking the unfortunate fellow in the
region of the heart, blood flowing copiously
from the wound. Medical aid was at once
summoned, as well as the Rev. Wm. Meagher,
P.P., Tallow, who administered the last rites.
Dr. M. J. Kenny also arriving on the scene, but
the poor fellow only lived for an hour and a
half after the accident.

SUDDEN DEATH IN THE CITY.

The death occurred at Thomondgate on
Sunday evening with painful suddenness of
John Coulan, a carter in the employment of
Messrs Archibald Walker and Sons, distillers.
For some days the deceased had complained of
a slight pain in the back, but beyond that he
appeared to enjoy normal health. Some time
after 5 o'clock on Sunday evening he went into
his own backyard, and suddenly dropped down.
When medical aid was summoned life was
extinct. The tragic event taking place within
twelve months of the death of his wife, who
succumbed to burns, has been greatly deplored
in the locality where he resides. He leaves two
children to mourn his demise. It was no con-
sidered necessary to hold an inquest.
