NURSES' REGISTRATION BILL

Ordered for Third Reading.
The Lord Chancellor took his seat on the Woolsack at 4.15.

Their lordships considered the Nurses' Regis-

tration Bill on report.

Viscount Wolverhampton, on behalf of the Government, proposed a new clause in substitution for that in the Bill making provision for existing nurses.

The Merquis of Salisbury moved an amendment that persons claiming to be registered, instead of producing a three years' certificate of training, should produce a certificate of training for such period as may be prescribed by rules to be framed by provisions under the Act. The object was to give grea er elasticity as to the period of training required.

The amendment was agreed to, and the

amended clause added to the Bill.

The Earl of Donoughmore moved a new clause, providing that if the General Council for the Registration of Nurses refuse to recognise any hospital or institution as an approved training school for nurses, the governing body of such hospital or institution, or any person aggrieved by such refusal, may make a representation to the Privy Council, and the decision of the Privy Council shall be binding on the Council.

The new clause was agreed to. The Bill was ordered for a third reading.

The House rose at 4 55.

BRUREE TRAGEDY.

Patrick Browne, the ex-policeman from Bourse, who attempted to commit suicide on Wednesday last by cutting his throat with a razor, succumbed to his injuries in the Kilmallock Union Hospital on Sunday night, and an inquest was held on the remains yester ay by Dr. M. R. Cleary, Coroner.

The evidence addiced went to show that the deceased was oreasionally addicted to drink, but on the morning he attempted to take his own his he was sober. The only motive for the rash act appeared to be attributable to some ejectwent proceedings against him at Quarter Se-sions.

The jury found that death was due inflammation of the throat and lungs brought on by a suicidal wound inflicted while temporarily insane.
