COZAR AND WAR DOGS.

DEATH OF MR. MICHAEL O'GORMAN.

We extremely regret to announce the death of Mr. Michael O'Gorman, an old and highly respected citizen, which took place at his residence, 77 George street, last evening. The deceased had been in failing health for some time, and his death was not unexpected. He was a gentleman of high standing in the city, where his business qualities were well known and appreciated. By his demise, one of the oldest links with Limerick's past is severed, and much that is interesting socially, commercially, and politically. For many years he carried on the business of House, Land, and Insurance Agent in the city, and prior to that he occupied the position of chief agent of the Grand Canal Company for Limerick and district. In 1854 he was elected a member of the Chamber of Commerce, on the proposition of Mr. Francis Spaight, and seconded by Mr. R. H. Todhunter and remained a member down to his death. He was Mayor of the city in 1879 and 1880, and discharged the duties of First Magistrate with dignity and ability. It was during his Mayoralty that the erection of the Dock clock was completed, and not a few improvements carried out in the city. The late Mr. O'Gorman was a man of excellent parts, and his demise will be learned with regret by the citizens in general. The funeral takes place from 77 George street, at 10 a.m. to-morrow.

STATE OF WEST

District Councillors

During the past ten days (says the 'West') numerous outrages have been committed in some parishes in West Wickliffe, a moonlight raid by an armed party the previous week on a farm near Lacken. In connection with the dispute between the tenants on the Kilmurry-McMahon farm and the Kilmurry-McMahon party demand was made on Mr. James O'Connell an outside farm and timber for distribution, the Kilmurry-McMahon Guardians recently intervened having the whole dispute submitted to arbitration.

Speaking at the Kilmurry-McMahon Boon Saturday, Mr. Patrick Lillie said the reply he got for his previous meeting for peace to Kilmurry-McMahon was that his stable visited on the following day and the tail of his mare cut off by a party of moonlighters who had absolute terror. He had been in danger of his life, yet this was how he had been treated when he tried, with the members of Guardians, to restore peace to the parishes.

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It was a disgrace to their country. Mr. Thomas Crotty, D.C., said that peace that was wanted there at Portumna was little of the taxation that was this horrible state of things in the county.
