LONDON TRAGEDY.

SHOT IN A TAXICAB.

Lady and Gentleman Found Dead.

A somewhat sensational tragedy, which bears every appearance of being a case of murder and suicide, was enacted in Bloomsbury, London, last night, the shocking occurrence taking place in a motor taxicab in Montagu Street, off Bedford Square.

Pedestrians were suddenly startled by a double report of a gun, but, probably thinking it was a burst tyre, as the taxicab was suddenly stopped, little notice was taken for the time. The driver of the cab, however, leapt from his seat on the stopping vehicle, and rushing to the door saw from a hasty glance within that something serious was the matter. Investigation was made by a constable, who was almost immediately on the scene, and as the result the driver was ordered to proceed immediately to the nearest hospital. That happened to be the Royal Homeopathic Hospital, Great Ormond Street, and on arrival there the occupants of the cab were carried into that institution. They proved to be a young lady and gentleman, of about 24 years of age, well dressed.

The briefest examination served to show that both were dead, shot through the head with a revolver, in the left and right temple respectively. The police took possession of the letters and other articles found on the clothing of the deceased, which will probably furnish evidence of identity at the coroner's inquest, which will be held probably to-day. The police, however, refuse to disclose any information they have on the subject. They also took possession of a six-chambered revolver found in the bottom of the cab two chambers of which had been discharged. The bodies remain at the hospital pending the coroner's orders.

VICTIMS IDENTIFIED.

The "Daily Mail" says—The letters found upon the man who, with a lady, was found shot in a taxicab in London, yesterday, indicated that he was William Bernard Davy, living at Worksop, Nottinghamshire, and that the woman was his wife. The licence for the revolver found on the man was taken out in the name of Davy in London yesterday morning.
