It areared that in the manufacture of spokes for he wheels of motor cars it is necessary have oak of the finest quality, and has been found that of all the oak rood coming into the market there was o oak equal to Trish eak for this purpose. In he year 1906 Messrs Stephenson and Co., llasgow, required about one million Irish oak pokes and entered into a contract with the laintiff firm. In that year the timber in the Aount Shannon demesne, near Limerick, was urchased by the defendant. It contained a arge quantity of oak suitable for the manufacure of spokes, and the plaintiffs made a conract with the defendant to sell them all the oak n the demesne of a diameter from 8 inches to 2 inches. The defendant had only supplied 63 ons, and plaintiffs had to purchase oak in the narket at a loss, in order to fulfil their contract rith Messes Stephenson. The defendant in his lefence traversed the causes of action, pleaded gnorance of plaintiffs' contract with Messrs Stephenson, and said it was impossible to make urther delivery during the bad weather and un-oreseen difficulties. He lodged £15 in court to neet plaintiffs' claim.
