Leroy Beaulieu says the private fortunes of the French nation represent a grand total of £9,030,000,000. #### AGRARIAN OUTRAGES IN IRELAND.

In the House of Commons on Tuesday, Mr. Birrell, in reply to a question set down by Mr. Lonsdale, said that in 1906 there were 20 agrarian and 36 non-agrarian outrages in Ireland in which firearms were used. In 1907 the respective totals were 56 and 53, and in the eleven months of this year 128 and 62. In regard to crimes involving injury to property the figures were—1906, 20 agrarian, 120 non-agrarian; 1907, 29 agrarian and 152 non-agrarian, and 1908. agrarian and 99 non-agrarian.

#### MCONLIGHTING OUTRAGE IN CLARE.

A report received in Ennis from East Clare brings particulars of an organised attack by moonlighters on Saturday night on the house of a farmer named Donal Minogue. About 8 p.m. several shots were fired through a window into the kitchen, in which there were at the time three or four children of Minogue's, and a servant boy. No one, however, was injured. Simultaneously another vollay of shots was fired, and some stones flung through the window of a bedroom in which Minogue and some other children were. None of them were struck. Several stones were also flung through the windows of another bedroom in which Minogue's mother was sleeping. The outrage is attributed to local feeling over a land dispute. No arrists have been made.
