THE LATE SIR THOMAS H. CLEEVE, D.L.

THE FUNERAL.

IMPOSING DEMONSTRATION OF RESPECT.

The Females of the late lame sted Sir Thomas Mr. W. McDonnell, J.P.; Mr. J. F. Power leeve, D.L., J.P. Ciby High Sheriff, were re- Mr. Wm. Holliday, Mr. J. Sp.llane, Mr. J. Cleave, D.L., J.P. City High Sheriff, were removed this morning at eleven o'clock from his residence, Sunville House, for interment in the family vault at St. Mary's Cathedral. That the premature demise of one of our leading and most influential and popular civizens is deeply regretted not alone to Limerick but throughout the South of Ireland and elsewhere, was demonstrated by the enormous number of people who came from all parts to pay a last mark of respect to his memory. The citizens of every class and ersed were represented to the full, and in addition to the staff and employer of the Condensed Milk Factory at Lansdowne, there were hundreds from the country branches, and a very hig gathering of the general public as well. It was the largest funeral seen in Limerick by the present generation, so enormous that when the bears had arrived at the Cathedral very many of a long line of carriages were still crossing the Welleslay Bridge. On all sides the deepest sympathy and respect were in evidence throughout the city. Plags were at half mast at St. Mary's Cashedral, Condensed Milk Factory, Chamber of Commerce, and various mercantile establishments, and at the Road Club, and Shannon Rowing Club, and the shipping in pore. All the houses along the line of route had their blinds drawn as the procession moved along, and the flag ways, were crowded with people amongst whom the deepest expressions of regret were heard at the passing away of a gentleman, whose very active and most successful career was so intimately bound up with the welfare of Limerick, both from an industrial and social point of view.

The members of the Corporation Fire Brigade acted as pall bearers, walking at either side of the hearse. The chief mourners and immediate friends, followed, and after these was a very long line of officials and employees from the city and the various county factories of the Condensed Milk Company of Ireland, of which Sir Thomas was Chairman and Managing Director, and also the staff of J. P. Evans and Co. Then came the Mayor, attended by the City Swordbearer and Sergeante with draped mace, and accompanied by the members of the Corporation and officials; and further on was a posse of some 50 of the R.I.C., under the command of District Inspector White and Head-Coustable Moore; a party of non-coramissioned officers of the Limerick City Artillery Reserve, and the Limerick Battalion Church Lads' Brigade under command of Captain A.J. Eakins, J.P. Then came the members of the Chamber of Commerce and the general public. The tributes of respect in the form of beautiful wreaths of natural flowers and crosses were so numerous that, in addition to
