

# OUT AND ABOUT.

A. M. Vandeleur, 2nd Life Guards, has been ordered to Cahiracon from visiting the Earl and Countess of Dunraven at Adare Manor.

Kilkee Petty Sessions and Town Court, Curtin, of Doonera, was prosecuted by District Inspector McNally for cruelty to Bridges, who was under 16 years of age. A fine and costs was imposed.

James O'Donnell, of Ball Alley Lane, was prosecuted by District Inspector Kelly, at the Petty Sessions and Town Court on the charge of stealing an oil overcoat from Patrick Donnelly, in the month of December. Accused was allowed out under the First offenders Act to come up for judgment when on.

The Limerick National School-teachers, at a meeting on Saturday, decided by a large majority to vote in favour of Irish being made compulsory in the new Irish University.

Captain Dundas, Quartermaster, Royal Irish Rifles, has been appointed Quartermaster of the 1st Battalion Manchester Regiment. He has lately been serving at the depot of the 1st Irish Regiment and was formerly employed as Quartermaster of the late 3rd Battalion Royal Irish Regiment.

On the wreck of the ill-fated Irada off the coast of the fishermen and others on the beach have kept a sharp look out for the bodies of the crew. Up to the present the remains of the ship and of two sailors have been recovered and buried.

Mr. Comerton said they had a very successful mechanical engineering class. There were 18 students, and of these 18 were from the Department of the Great Southern and Western Railway. He was also able to say that they had had an apprentice to the carpenter's trade, and building trade generally they had several apprentices, but they had had carpenters' apprentices. They had also had a sprinkling of those engaged in the electrical business. There were not many industrial classes in the city, but there were some in the motor car trade, and a number of them attended. The plumbing class had had a very good success.

Mr. Long asked if there were any further classes at the Corporation Power Station attending?

Mr. Comerton—Yes. We have a few classes. After some conversation, it was decided to send Messrs. Close and Comerton as delegates to the conference proposed by the Department.

### DUNRAVEN SCHOLARSHIPS—MRS. O'BRIEN'S BENEVOLENCE.

Mr. Comerton said he was glad to state that Alderman Joyce informed him that Mrs. O'Brien, of South Hill, had expressed her intention of lodging £100 to the credit of the Exhibition or Scholarship Fund, the initiative of Lord Dunraven.

Mr. Long—That is very good (hear, hear), and we propose that we pass Mrs. O'Brien a vote of thanks for her thoughtful action.

Rev. Brother Nolan seconded the motion.

Mr. Long thought it was only fair that they should express their thanks to the Mayor also for his contribution to the fund (hear, hear).

The Committee were very much obliged to the Mayor for what he promised, and also to the City High Sheriff.

The Mayor—And to Councillor Kenneally.

Mr. Long—Yes, and to several other gentlemen whom we waited on, notably Sir A. Shaw, Mr. Holliday, Mr. Archibald Murray, and others. They all promised us very considerable aid to the fund. He had no doubt that they would go after this meeting, and having done so, to the citizens and merchants were in favour of the scholarship they would receive very warm support from them. They were interested in technical education in the city, and would come forward generously and give aid to the movement.

The Mayor thanking Mr. Long for his remarks, and said they had initiated the scheme now. He hoped it would be the beginning of a successful movement that would result in the award of scholarships a great success. From what Mr. Comerton told him he thought they would have more scholarships than pupils.

Mr. Comerton—We have 900 students, and £100 will be given in prizes each year.

The Mayor—That will safeguard the scheme. The resolution of thanks to Mrs. O'Brien was unanimously adopted.

Mr. Comerton submitted a draft scheme for the scholarships examinations, and said it would be for the sub-committee to amend, or adopt it before the 1st proximo, and should be with the Department for approval. It was resolved to send a copy of the scheme for the consideration of Lord Dunraven, the initiator of the scheme.

The Department wrote that teachers should not be eligible for competition in the school examinations.
