 discourse on Samuel Lover at a literary tea table  
 gathering of the Irish Literary Society on  
 Thursday afternoon, says the London cor-  
 respondent of the "Independent." In the course  
 of his paper the author of "Father O'Flynn" gave  
 an account of Lover's life and activities, and  
 in criticising his writings, paid high tribute to  
 the brilliancy which adorned his prose and  
 poetical and humorous contributions to litera-  
 ture. Mr. Graves pointed out that Lover was a  
 good Irishman if for no other reason than that  
 he championed the cause of Irish musicians and  
 poets, whose works had been appropriated, or  
 attempted to be appropriated, by England and  
 Scotland.
