TRAGIC WEDDING SEQUEL.

Young Man's Sad Death.

A Waterford correspondent says—Particulars
of a very sad and distressing occurrence have
just reached me from the KilmacThomas district.
It seems that on Thursday, the 11th inst., a man
named Patrick Mullins, aged about 20 years, who
was employed by Mr. Edmond Hayes, Caherwane,
arrived about noon with a car for his sister at
the residence of Mr. T. Brazil, Caherwane,
whose sister was being married to Mr. E. Power,
Kilmurria. On arrival it seems that Mullins
and three other servant boys were treated to a
lunch, getting a glass of whiskey each. From
the evidence disclosed at the inquest it seems that
a jug containing whiskey was left on the table,
and that Mullins took it up and drank its con-
tents, with the result that he fell when leaving
the room and had to be helped to an adjoining
apartment by one of his companions, where he
slept until the return of Mr. Brazil and his
friend from Newtown, where the marriage had
been celebrated. Mr. Brazil, seeing that the
poor fellow was in a bad way, sent at once for
Dr. Foley, Bonmahon, who arrived with all
possible despatch. The doctor found him un-
conscious on arrival, and notwithstanding all
that medical skill could do Mullins passed away
in the presence of his father, who had been sum-
moned early to his bedside, at 7 o'clock the
following morning. Mr. M. J. Murphy, J.P.,
Tramore, (Deputy County Coroner) held an
inquest on the remains on Saturday, when
the jury returned a verdict in accordance with
the medical testimony that death resulted from
apoplexy.
