### Body Recovered.

As already reported reported two men, Reynold and Frazer, took a boat on Wednesday night at Castleconnell to cross the Shannon to the Clare side of the river. The boat was found adrift and unoccupied next morning, and it was feared that the missing men had been drowned. The apprehension proved true, the body of Reynolds being found yesterday morning at Doonass, a mile and a half westward of Castleconnell.

### The Inquest.

An inquest was held on the body yesterday by Dr. R. Clery, Coroner, and a jury. Evidence of identification having been given, the medical testimony, as supplied by Dr. Ryan, was to the effect that death was due to asphyxiation caused by drowning.

The jury's verdict was accordingly.

The body of Frazer, the other victim of the unfortunate accident has not yet been recovered.
