CASTLECONNELL BOATING FATALITY.

Second Body Found.

The body of Frazer, the second of the two men drowned at Castleconnell on Wednesday night, 17th inst., was recovered from the river by a fisherman named Myres yesterday. Frazer was got close to where the body of the other man, Reynolds, was recovered on Monday, a mile from Castleconnell, in the direction of Limerick. The Coroner was communicated with, and it was not deemed necessary to hold an inquest.

A BRIDGE AT CASTLE-CONNELL.

At the inquest on James Reynolds, the jury added the following rider to a verdict of accidental death—"That in view of the many drowning accidents that have occurred in the locality, we desire to impress on the County Councils of Limerick and Clare the urgent necessity of erecting a bridge at Castleconnell."—Signed on behalf of the jury—Joseph Duffy (foreman), James Hogg, Michael R. O'Leary (coroner).

FIRE OUTBREAK AT RATHKEALE

A fire broke out in the hairdressing saloon of Mr. Cornelius Aherne, Rathkeale, on Sunday night. The shop was closed at the time, but the overhead part was in occupation of a man named Egan, who was in bed when the alarm was raised. On opening the bedroom door, dense volumes of smoke, flashed into Egan's face with the result that he had to return to his room, and escape by jumping through the window. A little later the police arrived on the scene and assisted by the inhabitants, the flames were got under after considerable difficulty, when it was found that the premises were completely gutted.

COST OF EXTRA POLICE.

In the House of Commons, Mr. Lonsdale asked the Chief Secretary to furnish a statement showing, as regards each of the counties declared by proclamation issued in August, 1907, and June, 1908, to be in a state of disturbance, the total amount levied off each such county in respect of the cost of additional police employed therein for the years 1905, 1906, 1907, and 1908 respectively.

Mr. Birrell—In accordance with statutory requirements, the accounts of the cost of extra police are furnished for the half-years ending 30th September and 31st March. The following statement shows the sums levied or to be levied off the counties referred to in the question in respect of the cost of additional police employed therein in the financial year, 1905-6, 1906-7, and 1907-8, and the half-year ended 30th September, 1908, respectively—

Mr. Rabilly—It would appear from the Chairman's remarks that a member would not be permitted to suggest improvements.

The Chairman (hotly)—I was here when you were fighting for your King and country (laughter).

Mr. Rabilly—I am not ashamed of my actions, but I will not descend to personalities.

The incident then dropped, and the Committee having transacted miscellaneous business, adjourned.
