Fr. Murphy observed that it would be well to say that the first part of the circular set out very clearly an important point which was accidentally represented in a fashion at Tuesday's meeting as to be misleading. One of the speakers mentioned the point very distinctly, and he had intended to call attention to it, when he spoke subsequently, but it escaped his memory. The speaker in question spoke of the local prize fund as leading up to the Dunraven Scholarship for commercial educaton. He made it appear from his statement tuat the Dunraven Scholarships were to be confined to the commercial department, whereas the Committee were very auxious that it should be distinctly understood that neither the Duniaven Schola ships nor the Local Prize Fund were in any way confined to commercial departments. Quite the contrary. I'vey were open to ecience, art, and technology, as well as commercial subjects, and it would be an unfortunate thing if the ides got abroad among the citizens that the whole of the Prize Fund and Scholarships Fund were created solely for commercial training. The Committee wanted to go in for the promotion of trade and industry as well as commercial methods.

The Chairman said he had intended to call attention to the error, as it would have a bad effect in the county especially. He (the Chairman) had great hopes that when the County Council thoroughly understood the whole scheme the Dunraver Scholarships would be available for the county as well as the city. It would be unfortunate for the county if these scholarships wore not available for science and art as well as commercial subjects.

The other members agreed, and the circular was adopted with the amendments suggested by Father Murphy.
