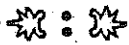


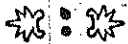

CARBURETTED WATER GAS

Opinion of Dr. McGrath.

Acting on instruction received from the Public Health Committee as to the effects of carburetted water gas on the health of the citizens, Dr. McGrath, Superintendent Medical Officer of Health, has presented his report to the Committee. Dr. McGrath goes very minutely into the question from a hygiene standpoint, and the outcome of his report, it is stated, is that the gas as proposed to be used is not more than ordinarily dangerous to health.
