DEATH OF FATHER DONOR, P.P., SHANAGOLDEN.

We regret to record the death of the Rev.
Donor, P.P., Shanagolden, which took place
yesterday in his 61st year, and after an illness
of some duration. The rev. gentleman who was
a native of the west of the county was for
several years principal of St. Munchin's College,
Shanagolden Parish. He was a well-known man of
letters, and a great linguist.

the following :-

To the people of Cork.
Fellow Countrymen,—Recent developments,
and especially the defection of no less than five
members of Parliament, including my own
colleague in the representation of Cork City,
make it impossible for me to continue further
in my seat upon a country apparently
unwilling or unable to hear me, and I shall
therefore resign my seat in Parliament at once. I have
no doubt that it was, perhaps, possible for one
of us to do. The masses of the people of the
County and City of Cork, I am sure, know how
valuable I am for their unchangeable fidelity. I
am reproached for the poor people of the rest
of the country, who have been acting in tragic
ignorance of what they were doing.—Your

THE LATE MR. LONDON, M.P.

Removal of Remains to Ireland.

The remains of the late Mr. London, M.P.,
were on Thursday conveyed from his Brixton
residence to Paddington Station, and despatched
by the 8.45 train for Ireland.

There were impressive scenes at Paddington,
where a large assemblage of colleagues and
friends of the late member attended to pay a
tribute of mournful respect to his memory.

Accompanying the remains to Ireland were—
Mr. Thomas London (son of the deceased), and
Messrs. Joyce, Cullinan, and Sheehy, who were
deputed by the Irish party to represent it at
the funeral; also Mr. O'Shaughnessy, M.P., who
travelled over with the funeral party to Killeely.

The daughter of the deceased, who is a Sister
of Nazareth, accompanied by the Rev. Mother of
Nazareth House, Hammersmith, and another
Sister, were amongst the mourners.
