HOURS OF LABOUR IN RUSSIA.

The Prefect of Odessa has made a decree fixing the labouring day for artisans at twelve hours, out of which two hours are allowed for rest and meals. In addition to these two hours, youths under 17 must be allowed three hours daily to attend school. Overtime is permitted only in extreme cases. Artizans such as bakers and barbers, who work on Sundays, must be given the following day for rest.

At the meeting of Cork County Council on Tuesday, it was decided to accept the lowest tender, that of the Athlone Company, for the principal items in the printing contract. Various other firms were each declared contractors for particular parts of the work.

A prohibition against the taking or destroying of the eggs of wild birds in the County Kerry between the 1st May and the 1st August next year is published in the "Dublin Gazette." Among the birds mentioned are the raven, kingfisher, owl, goldfinch, snipe, woodcock, golden eagle, and sea eagle.

Mr. John Maguire, secretary to the Irish Salmon and Trout Association wrote acknowledging the receipt of suggestions, regarding the Inland Fisheries, and thanking the Board therefor.

DRIFT NET CAPTURED.

Mr. F. Hall, Inspector of bailiffs, reported that on Sunday night, the 25th ult., two of the Conservators bailiffs captured a drift net illegally fishing near the Lax Weir waters.

Mr. Blood-Smyth—Did the bailiffs catch the men who were fishing?

Mr. Hall answered in the negative.

Mr. Blood-Smyth asked was the net a good net, a genuine one.

Mr. Hall—Yes; they would not fish for salmon with any other. It is a Coonagh net. The capture was a very smart one.

The Chairman—What is the value of the net.

Mr. Blood-Smyth—£3; but we get nothing for them.

On the motion of Mr. Blood-Smyth it was agreed that the two bailiffs should get the usual reward in such cases, ten shillings each.

Mr. Blood-Smyth—It is always well to encourage those men.

The Chairman—Oh, certainly.

RESOLUTION RE INLAND FISHERIES.

Mr. Blood-Smyth asked was there any reply from the Department as to the resolution of the Board relative to the inland fisheries.

Mr. Alton said there was a mere acknowledgment, which he had read.

Mr. Blood-Smyth said he saw the other day where there was a motion made to give a large grant to the Irish Fisheries, and the fact did not appear to be at all mentioned that there were inland or salmon fisheries in Ireland at all. That fact he noticed over and over again was never mentioned in the House of Commons discussion so. When they were discussing fishery matters regarding Ireland they never seemed to think about the Inland Fisheries.

The Chairman—No, they always refer to the trawling question or the Deep Sea Fisheries.

Mr. Pegum—Or the herring fishery.

Mr. Blood-Smyth said there were enormous interests at stake in the Irish inland fisheries, and yet they were always overlooked in the House of Commons. They did not seem to realise the enormous amount of money sunk in the inland fisheries at all, and yet if they were helped their revenue might be doubled in a few years.

The Chairman—Would you like to propose a resolution calling attention to the matter, and asking some member to move a resolution on the subject?

Mr. Blood-Smyth—I don't think it would be any use now. We might take it the Government would not give any grant. They are not in a position at present to give a grant to anything.

The Chairman—I think so.

Mr. Blood-Smyth—It would only be a waste of time to pass a resolution.

Mr. Mackey did not see why Mr. Blood-Smyth should hesitate to propose a resolution. He thought it would be a pity to drop the money part of the matter.

Mr. Blood-Smyth said he did not drop it but he thought it useless to look for any money, as there was no chance of getting it.

Mr. Mackey did not agree with that view, and so he would propose—"That this meeting of the Limerick Fishery Board begs to direct the attention of Mr. Russell, Vice-President of the Department of Agriculture to the vital necessity of at once introducing his Bill in connection with the advancement and protection of the inland fisheries of Ireland, and that adequate provision be made in connection with the Bill to allocate ample financial means to enable the many Boards of Ireland to discharge their duties towards the advancement of such important interests as constitute the inland fisheries of the country, and which for want of governmental assistance have been deplorably neglected in the past."
