### DEATH OF MR. C. TYNAN.

Thomas Bourke, publican, Wickham street, was summoned for having some men on his licensed premises at twenty minutes past 11 o'clock on Sunday night, 4th instant.

The case against one of the men found on the premises by Constable Corbett was dismissed, and the two others were fined 2s. 6d. each.

John Rainsford, publican, Wickham street, and Margaret Sullivan, ditto, were also summoned for having their licensed premises open on Sunday evening, 11th instant, at 5.15 p.m. and 5.11 p.m. respectively.

The magistrates dismissed the cases with a caution.

Other cases were heard, and the Court adjourned.

### BOATING ACCIDENT.

#### Four Men Drowned.

Halifax (N.S.), Friday.—Four men, three of whom were English miners, have been drowned in Glace Bay through the capsizing of a sailing boat. The boat encountered five squalls, and the sail caught and could not be loosened. Two bodies were found entangled in the sail, and the others at a distance. A fifth man was unconscious when rescued.

### MUNSTER CUP QUALIFICATIONS.

#### Important Decision.

A meeting of the Munster Rugby Branch Professor Alexander Cork, Vice-President, in the chair, was held last night at Cruise's Royal Hotel. All the eight clubs—Garryowen, Constitution, Rockwell, Queen's College (Cork), Cork County, Lansdowne, Crescent, Presentation—being represented. The object of the meeting was to revise the rules generally, and the proceedings were protracted.

It was unanimously decided with regard to the Munster Challenge Cup that to enjoy the right to competition members of teams should have a twenty-eight days residential qualification in their club district from the opening of the season, 1st October, and that travelling teams be assisted by the branch to £5, where 10 per cent. of the gate money showed a shortage.

Other modifications were adopted.
