DEATH OF MR. FRANCIS A. O'KEEFFE.

We regret extremely to record the death of a Very highly cateemed Limerick gentleman, Mr. F. A. O'Keeffe, ex-M.P., which took place resterday at Athy, the residence of his brother Father O'Keeffe, Aim. The deces ed gentleman who bal been in failing health for some time tast was born in 1856, and was son of the late Mr. La srence O'Keoffe, George street, who was High Sher.ff in 1886, and for reveral years a member of the Corporation. Mr. O Keeffe was educated in the Jesuit College, Limerick, Clongowes Wood College, and Trinity C llage, Dublin, and he obtained first place in Mauity Jurisprudence at the Bessionsl, and a special certificate of merit at his final examination for Solicitor, He was an eminort classical scholar, and took a great interest in literary purcuits. He entered the C rporation come time in the eighbics, and in 1887 was elected Mayor an honour which was sgam conferred on him for the two succeeding year. During his Mayoralty the Ucreoration built arbizans dwellings in Sir Harry's Mall, Mary street, and Albunkard street, and be had the distinction of turning the first sod of the new water works scheme at Clareville. It is interesting too, to note that it was on Mr O'Kroffe's moulen the Public Libraries Act was first adopted in Limerick. In 1888 Mr. O'Kroffe was elected Nationalist Representative of the City in Parlament, and he continued to do so till 1900. Mr. O'Keeffe r tired from his profession as a Solicitor (practising in Limerick) several years ago, and since then has resided in Dublin, though frequently paying visits to the old city, especially in the Summer sesson when he always rationised Kilkee. He was a gentleman of a most penial, exterisining, and kindly manner. and was highly esteemed by very wany friends in Limerick and cliewhere, who was beard of bis demise with great regret. The funeral is to take place to-morrow (Friday), at 1.30 p.m., from-Limerick Terminus for Mount St. Laurence Cemetery.
