PORTNARD BOG DISPUTE.

A Settlement.

A settlement has been effected in connection with the Portnard Bog dispute, and the additional force of police drafted into Cappamore to cope with any disturbances that might arise will be withdrawn in the course of a few days. During the week an Inspector from the Estates Commissioners' Department visited Cappamore, and as a result of his investigation the Commissioners have agreed to apportion an acre and a quarter of bog and some of the commage to the villagers.

DROWNING FATALITY IN THE SHANNON.

The remains of a woman, which have been identified as those of Bridget Brody, of Bowles lane, were recovered from the Shannon at Rhoebogue at noon to-day by some men who were working near the place. It has not yet been ascertained how the woman got into the water, but from the particulars gleaned she must not have been there very long. Some people state that she was at divine service at 7 o'clock this morning in one of the city churches. The deceased, who was about 70 years of age, was married. Pending an inquest the body was taken to the morgue.

DEATH OF MRS. GUINANE.

The remains of the deceased lady will be removed this evening at 8 o'clock from 10 Lansdowne Terrace to St. Munchin's R.C. Church, and at 1.30 to-morrow the funeral will take place for Mount St. Laurence Cemetery.

WOMAN'S STRANGE DEATH

A woman on Thursday alighted at Reading station out of a South Eastern Railway Company's train in a dazed condition. She seemed to move with great difficulty, and a porter assisted her to a waiting room. Her condition was such as to lead to the supposition that she might be suffering from the effects of some narcotic. A doctor, however, declared that there was no indication of the administration of any drug, and she died without being able to give any account of herself. A telegram to-day says—A tattooed woman, found in a semi-conscious condition in a train at Reading, and who died yesterday, has been identified as Emily Chapman, wife of a soldier at Aldershot.

LORD C. BERESFORD AND THE NAVY.
