SANGUINARY RIOT IN CALABRIA.

Ten Killed and Wounded.

Rome, Monday.

A crowd of twenty-five hundred people assembled yesterday evening in the square before the Town Hall at Sinopoli, Calabria, and demanded a distribution of relief by the Municipality. Three carabinieri who tried to calm the people were stoned. One of them was struck by a stone, and, believing himself in danger, fired on the mob. The rioters then disarmed him, and in turn fired upon his two comrades. The latter were both injured, and fired in self-defence on their assailants, killing four of them and wounding six. Some of the wounded were bad characters who had already served terms of imprisonment for different offences. By this time the troops had arrived and order was restored. An Inspector General, representing the Ministry of the Interior, is expected to arrive here to open an inquiry.

SUDDEN DEATH.

While walking through Nelson Street last evening an old woman named Mary O'Brien suddenly collapsed and died within the space of a few minutes. Sergeant Duran, who was on duty near the Railway, hurried to the woman's assistance, but before medical aid was at hand life was extinct. The deceased was taken to her house close by at Lady's Lane. She was in her 76th year and was married.

EARL CREWE AND THE COLONIES.

The Earl of Crewe, Colonial Secretary, speaking at the annual banquet of the London Chamber of Commerce held in London, referred to the forthcoming conference of Chambers of Commerce to be held at Sydney. He advocated the passing of a non-committal resolution on the question of commercial relations between the Colonies and this country at that conference where opinion might be divided. He also urged them not to mix up the question of commercial relations with the question of Imperial defence. The object of the Government on Imperial defence was to countenance a great Imperial system, with the utmost flexibility to each part of the Empire.
