**DEATH OF MISS C. G.
 O'BRIEN.**

We regret extremely to record the death,
 which occurred on the 3rd instant at her resi-
 dence, Ardanoir, Foynes, of Miss Charlotte
 Grace O'Brien, younger daughter of the late
 Wm. Smith O'Brien, of Cahermoyle, and sister
 of the Dean of Limerick. Miss O'Brien had
 lived a retired life for many years past at her
 pretty residence by the Shannon, but a
 quarter of a century ago or more she took a
 most active and prominent part for the better-
 ment of the conditions of emigrants, whether
 on board ship or on shore. She was the means
 of founding homes in Queenstown and New
 York for girls, and frequently crossed the
 Atlantic and saw the young women safely
 settled down in suitable employment. Miss
 O'Brien was altogether of a most philanthropic
 and benevolent disposition, and in Foynes,
 where she was greatly respected and esteemed,
 her demise, which came rather suddenly, is
 greatly deplored. The deceased lady was a well
 known botanist, and her contributions to the
 magazines were greatly appreciated by lovers of
 science. She was also the author of several
 works.

At a specially convened meeting of the Foynes
 Gaelic League held on the 3rd inst, Mr. W.
 Purtil, V.P., presiding, the following resolution
 was unanimously adopted:—"That we the mem-
 bers of the Foynes Gaelic League having heard
 with the utmost regret of the death of our highly
 esteemed fellow member Miss Charlotte Grace
 O'Brien, who was a staunch supporter of the
 Irish Revival, and of every other movement
 having for its object the betterment of the Irish
 people, beg to tender to her relatives and friends
 our most sincere sympathy in the great loss they
 have sustained by her death, but we are sure
 that the memory of her many good deeds will
 live long in the hearts of the people."
