

which butter is sold. Mr. Ryan did not attach so much importance to names as to the palate of the customer, which was the really governing principle, as if a person was sold butter once which suited his taste he was likely to purchase it again; but he thought any alteration in established lines as regards names would be injurious. He did not think anyone was misled in the slightest degree by names, as it was as he had said all a question of the palate. Messrs Cleeve sold all their butter under their own name. In regard to the blending of butter he considered that if the produce of two creameries were blended the butter would still be entitled to be called creamery butter, provided nothing else had been mixed with it, and such blending would be an advantage, as in one creamery butter might be of too high a colour, and in another too low, and the blending in such instances would improve the colouring. He welcomed any steps for the inspection of milk provided it did not hamper the suppliers. There is a marked improvement in the condition in which milk is now sent to creameries, and in Messrs Cleeve's creameries there was a constant system of inspection to see that all cans were clean and that milk was supplied under the best conditions. He disapproved of the suggested grading of butter as it would tend to cause delay in despatch from creameries which would be injurious as entailing loss, and he did not think there was any occasion for a registered brand.

AN UNWELCOME VISITOR

In Curio Shop.

Mr. Joseph P. Lynch, P.L.G., curio and antique dealer, Bedford Row, was plaintiff in an action brought against Mr. William O'Connell, victualler, at the Quarter Sessions on Thursday for damages for negligence, occasioned by a heifer of defendants breaking into his shop and destroying property to the amount of £47 10s.

Mr. J. S. Gaffney, solr., appeared for the plaintiff; and Mr. P. Kelly (instructed by Mr. T. M. Kenny, solr.) for the defendant. The plaintiff's evidence, which created much amusement, was to the effect that in January, 1908, the animal ran into the shop and destroyed pictures, plate glass, and other articles of value. A portrait of the brother of the late Bishop Tuohy's was damaged. Also curies and as many as 1500 volumes of rare books.

In reply to Mr. Kelly, the plaintiff said one of the books which suffered by the intrusion was a "History of the Roman Empire."

Mr. Kelly—Do you know that is on the index? Plaintiff replied in the negative, and added that he would not read any book that was on the index.

Mr. Kelly suggested that the heifer had a taste for theology as well as the fine arts, and the plaintiff presumed that she had.

Counsel contended that the claim could not be entertained on the ground of negligence.

His Honor looked upon the claim as ridiculous, and awarded £4 15s, the value of the plate glass.

DEATH OF MR. J. MURPHY.

His many friends in Limerick will learn with regret of the death of Mr. John Murphy, which occurred on Thursday night after a tedious illness. The deceased, who was a prominent member of Garryowen Football Club, had not been in the best of health for some time. While playing for his club in Cork two years ago in very inclement weather he contracted a severe cold, and ever since he suffered from an impaired constitution. Last October he was obliged to relinquish his business, and despite all that medical aid could do he passed away on Thursday night in the fullness of manhood. By his death another link is snapped in the chain of local football celebrities, and wherever the name of Garryowen Football Club is known the news of Mr. Murphy's demise will be received with regret. The funeral will take place from St. John's Cathedral at three o'clock to-morrow for interment in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery.

DEATH OF MR J. M. KIDD.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. James Morgan Kidd, which took place at his residence, Rathgar, Dublin, at 3 o'clock this morning. The deceased gentleman, who had attained his sixty-eight year was father of Mr. William M. Kidd, and Mr. Edward Kidd, family grocers, of this city, and having retired from business here several years since, went to reside in Dublin five or six years ago. The late Mr. Kidd was a native of Dundee, and came to Limerick half a century ago. He started business at 4 George-street, in partnership with the late Mr. James Fife, and in a short time he succeeded in establishing one of the foremost Italian and grocery warehouses in the city. Mr. Kidd was a gentleman of sound commercial views, and of a very courteous manner. In Limerick he had made many friends who will learn with much regret of his demise. The remains will arrive in the city by the 9.55 train on Monday morning, after which the funeral will start for St. Mary's Cathedral where the interment will take place.
