## FATAL ACCIDENT AT NEWPORT.

On Thursday afternoon, through the collapse  
of a scaffolding at the town of Newport, near  
Nenagh, a young labourer named Michael Haugh  
fell 20 feet, and was instantly killed, the base of  
the skull being fractured. At an inquest, held  
yesterday evening, a verdict in accordance with  
the medical testimony was returned.

## ACCIDENT AT THE DOCKS.

While playing at the Docks on Thursday

in the cog, and had the four fingers of his right

## DIED SUDDENLY AT HIS WORK.

A man named Sullivan was suddenly seized  
with illness while at his work on Thursday even-  
ing in the Locomotive Works, Great Southern  
and Western Railway and died in a short time.  
The deceased, who was a mechanic was about  
68 years of age, and a widower. He was a man
