RE SUMMER ASSIZES The Calendar

Clare Summer Assizes will be opened on day by Mr. Justice Johnson in the Hall Court. The following is the calendar charges—Martin Foley, assault on Ml. Foley on 17th May at Lidoonvarna. John Moriarty, junr., maliciously wounding the property of George Perry on 29th March. Thomas Consideine, larceny of sheep, amounting to 8th June, from George Meehan. Thomas Consideine, larceny of two sheep from John Griffey, on the 9th or 3rd June. John Frazer, assault on John Joe Fox and John Reidy, by stabbing with a knife on 30th April. Peter Casey, assault on the police on 18th June, and with being a habitual drunkard. John Kerin, maiming a cow at Skroughan on the 21st May, the property of James Kerin. Bridget Quanne, attempted murder.

FASHIONABLE WEDDING IN DUBLIN.

A pretty wedding was solemnised on Thursday forenoon at St. Bartholomew's Church, Elgin-road, Dublin, the contracting couple being Miss Evelyn Collis, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Collis, of 3 Elgin-road, and Mr. John Maston Patrickson, of the 86th Carnatic Infantry (Indian Army), eldest son of the late John Patrickson, 21st Royal Scots Fusiliers, and Mrs. Patrickson, of Bray, Co. Wicklow. The officiating clergy were the Rev. C. O'Hara Mease (Vicar-Dean of the Chapel Royal), the Rev. T. S. O'Connell (Rector of Castleconnell, brother-in-law of the bridegroom), and the Rev. Digby Scott, of Bray. The bridesmaids were Miss McCormick, Miss Evelyn Little, Miss Gladys Fleming, Miss Kathleen Castles, and Miss Hilda Middleton. The bridesmaids were Master Denis Pringle and Miss Sheila Findlater, and the best man was Mr. John Patrickson, brother of the bridegroom. The bride's dress was of white ivory satin with an apron of chiffon, heavily embroidered in pearls. The bodice was trimmed with lace and pearls of pearls. She wore a full length court train, and carried a big bunch of Harasist lilies. A coronet of myrtle and white leather completed the charming appearance of the bride. Her only ornament was a pair of pearl ear-rings, the gift of her mother. The bridesmaids wore ivory net dresses over satin, trimmed with sabouche braid, and pale blue sashes. They had pale blue hats, trimmed with white coloured veils and blue. Their ornaments were aqua-marine and pearl pendants, the gifts of the bridegroom, and they also carried flower-baskets slung over their shoulders with blue ribbons, which contained three shades of roses. The bridesmaids were dressed in white satin, and their dresses from the bridegroom were a set of gold-embroidered waistcoat buttons and a pearl brooch for the little girl. A largely-attended reception was afterwards held at the residence of the bride in Elgin road, the drawingroom of which was beautifully decorated with white flowers. At the far end of the room was a cleverly-

miraculous escape. The bedroom window was shattered. A shot was also discharged through the kitchen window, and the bullet perforated a dresser opposite the window. No motive is assigned for the outrage, and O'Brien has lodged a claim for compensation.

DEATH OF MR. ANTHONY BOYLE.

His many friends and old colleagues in Limerick will hear with regret of the death at Newcastle-on-Tyne of Mr. Anthony Boyle, who was for many years one of the chief clerks at the Local Custom House offices. Some twelve years ago Mr. Boyle was transferred from Limerick to England on duty, and about two years ago he retired from the service on the full pension of his class. For some months past he was in indifferent health, and his death took place at Newcastle after a somewhat painful illness. Mr. Boyle during his stay in Limerick was an active member of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, and other charitable and religious institutions.

FUNERAL OF MRS J HOGAN

Yesterday the remains of the late Mrs. Hogan were interred at Killeely amid genuine manifestations of sorrow. The deceased lady, who was wife of Mr. James Hogan, Killoolan, Ballynaety, and third daughter of Mr. Thomas B. Mitchell, J.P., Ballybricken, had been only a few days ill and her demise at the very early age of twenty seven, came as a keen shock to her husband and friends. The funeral, which left Ballybricken R.C. Church at noon, was of immense proportions, embracing mourners from the city and county, as well as from the adjoining counties of Clare and Tipperary. It was a representative cortege in every respect, and fully expressive of the great esteem entertained for the deceased lady, her husband, and the members of her own family. The principal mourners were—Mr. James Hogan, D.C., husband; Mr. F. B. Mitchell, J.P., father; her brothers, and brothers-in-law, as well as a number of relatives. Several clergymen took part in the procession from the Church to the cemetery, a distance of six miles; while it would be an impossibility to give anything approaching a complete list of the general body of mourners.
