## DEATH OF MR. M. MOYLETT.

Much regret will be felt at the news of the death of Mr. Michael Moylett, which took place unexpectedly at his residence, Carr Street yesterday morning. The deceased had been out on Sunday, and appeared in his usual health. He retired to bed showing no symptoms of illness, and did not complain until about midnight, when a doctor and clergyman were sent for. He gradually grew worse, and passed away a couple of hours later. Mr. Moylett, who was well known in the city, was for many years connected with the firm of Messrs Michael Egan and Sons, wine merchants, Patrick Street. He was a gentleman of considerable business capacity, and immensely popular with everyone who knew him. His unexpected demise has caused genuine regret in the city.

The remains of the late Mr Michael Moylett were interred this afternoon in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. At three o'clock the funeral left St. Michael's R.C. Church, and the cortege was in every respect representative and influential.

## PRESUMED SAD ACCIDENT AT KILKEE.

### An Old Fisherman falls off George's Head.

Our Kilkee correspondent writes:—What is presumed to be a very sad drowning accident occurred on Sunday, when an old fisherman named Michael Gallagher, of Corbally (better known locally as Crasheen), aged about 70 years while fishing for rock fish at George's Head, is supposed to have fallen from that dizzy height into the sea and was drowned. Gallagher, who was married twice, leaves a young family to mourn his loss. A search has been made last evening and is continued to-day (Monday), by the fishermen, and police, but no trace has been found of the unfortunate man up to the present, as the sea is running very high, and nobody can approach the scene of the tragic occurrence.

The following statement was made to the police by a young man named Tom Houlihan, who was fishing with Gallagher and saw him last:— "I remember Sunday, the 18th July, I went to George's Head fishing with a hand-line about eleven o'clock. I was fishing alone until about two o'clock, when Michael Gallagher, of Crasheen, came to the same place where I was, with a line. We fished together until about three o'clock. I caught two small rockfish only, and he had one at the time I was leaving, about half-past three. He said to me before I left that he was going home after a couple of more throws. I then bade him good evening when leaving, and came away to a fishing place called Sandy Bottom, west of Burns' Hole. I did not see him afterwards. He had working clothes on him at that time. During the time I was with him he was as conversable and as jolly as ever I saw him. He was fishing on a narrow ledge of rock overhanging the sea at George's Head, and had beside him a tin can containing bait."
