PRESUMED SAD ACCIDENT AT KILKEE.

An Old Fisherman falls off George's Head.

Our Kilkee correspondent writes :- What is presumed to be a very sad drowning accident occurred on Sunday, when an old fisherman named Michael Gallagher, of Corbally (butter known locally as Crusheen), aged about 70 years while fishing for rock fish at George's Head, is supposed to have fallen from that dizzy height into the sea and was drowned. Gallagher, who was married twice, leaves a young family to mourn A s arch has been made last evening and is continued to-day (Monday), by the fisher-men, and police, but no trace has been found of the unfortunate man up to the present, as the sea is running very high, and nobody can ap-

proach the scene of the tragic occurrence.

The following statement was made to the police by a young man named Tom Houlihan, who was fishing with Gallagher and saw him last: "I remember Sunday, the 18th July, I went to George's Head fishing with a hand-line about eleven d'elock. I was fishing alone until about two e'clock, when Michael Gallagher, of Crusheen, came to the same place where I was, with a line. We fished together until about three e'clock. I caught two small rockfish only, and he had one at the time I was leaving, about half-past three. He said to me before I left that he was going nome after a couple of mere throws. I then bade him good evening when leaving, and came away to a fishing place called Sandy Bettom, west of Burns' Hole. I did not see him afterwards. He tad working clothes on him at that time. During the time I was with him he was as conversable and as jolly as ever I saw him. He was fishing on a narrow ledge of rock overhanging the sea at George's Head, and had beside him a tin can containing bait."
