CORK CITY REGATTA.

Limerick Crews Success.

Limerick was represented at the Cork City Regatta yesterday by Limerick B.C., Shannon B.C., St. Michael's B.C., and Athlunkard B.C., embracing in all fourteen crews, exclusive of the senior sculls, which was confined to Shannon alone. Bright summer weather favoured the fixture, and the attendance was of immense proportions. In an analysis of the events, Limerick, per Shannon and St. Michael's, captured four out of the ten trophies, the others going to Dublin and Cork crews. Details:—
Tyrol Prizes, for Senior Pairs—Shannon, 1; Dolphin, 2. Won in a paddle.

Maiden Fours—Lee, 1; Cork, 2. Won by a length clear.

Ladies Challenge Cup, Senior Fours—Shannon, 1; Cappoquin, 2; Commercial, 3; Limerick, 0. Won by a clear length.

Inter-Schools Cup, for Junior Eights—Lee, 1; Castleknock, 2; Shannon, 0. Won by a canvas.

Lee Challenge Cup, Junior Fours—Dublin, 1; Cappoquin, 2; Athlunkard, 3; Shannon, 0; Limerick, 0; Neptune, 0. Won by a length. Limerick broke an ear on the journey, and dropped astern.

Cork City Challenge Cup (Senior Fours)—Shannon, 1; Shandon, 2; Limerick, 3. Won a grand race by half a length.

Marina Challenge Cup (Junior Fours)—St. Michael's, 1; Athlunkard, 2; Shannon, 3; Neptune, 0; Commercial, 0; Lee, 0; Shandon, 0; Fermoy, 0. Won by a length clear, a foot between second and third.

Leander Grand Challenge Cup (Senior Eights)—Shannon, 1; Shannon, 2; Limerick, 0. Verdict a length clear.

Fitzgerald Arnett Challenge Cup (Junior Eights)—Dublin, 1; Commercial, 2; Shannon, 3; Lee, 0; Neptune, 0; Shandon, 0; Athlunkard, 0. Athlunkard smashed a rigger at the start, and the race was started without them. It was a good race for most of the journey, and the verdict in favour of Dublin was half a length clear.

Championship of Lee (Senior Scullers)—Shannon (J. Shanahan), 1; Shannon (J. Glazer), 0. Won easily.

DAIRIES AND COWSHEDS ACT, (IRELAND).

In the House of Commons, Mr. Lunden asked the Chief Secretary if in view of the fact that the majority of the District Councils of Ireland have refused to put the Dairies and Cowsheds Act into operation on the grounds that it is unnecessary and only creating additional taxation, the Local Government Board will withdraw legal proceedings which have been threatened against some such Councils, and make the Order heretofore compulsory, an optional one with the various Councils as to whether they will enforce it or not?

Mr. Birrell—I understand that only a very small minority of the District Councils in Ireland have refused to put the Order in question into operation. Officers have already been appointed for nearly half the districts in the country, and additions are steadily being made to their number. Compulsory action has only been

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
