Desperate Engagement in Mellisa.

Telegrams from Barcelona indicate that the state of anarchy which prevails in that city has now reached an acute stage. The blowing up of railway bridges and the tearing up of the lines has cut off all communication, and the authorities are thus prevented from massing troops to prevent disorder. The rioters have thrown up barricades in the streets, and these are being demolished by artillery fire. The revolutionary movement is spreading to several towns in Catalonia. The Cabinet, in consultation with King Alfonso, who returned hurriedly to Madrid yesterday for a conference with his Ministers, decided to issue a decree suspending Constitutional guarantees throughout Spain.

Another desperate engagement has been fought in Mellisa between the Spanish troops and the Moors. The Spanish losses numbered over 200 killed and wounded, among the killed being General Pintos and two Lieutenant-Colonels. The casualties among the Moors are described as enormous. The battle arose out of a successful attempt on the part of the Spaniards to re-victual their advanced posts on the mine railway. The convoy was successfully brought in, and the engagement is claimed as a victory for the Spanish troops.

SUDDEN DEATH AT BALLY-BUNION.

Dr. John Clancy, Coroner for North Kerry, held an inquest on Tuesday on the body of a woman named Margaret Fitzgerald, aged 50 years, and a native of Newcastle West.

From the evidence it appeared that the deceased, who was a servant in the employment of Mr. Phelan, merchant, Newcastle West, and at present staying at Beasley's Lodge, Ballybunion, went out on the previous day, Monday, for a bath, and on coming out of the water complained of feeling weak. On the following day she went bathing again, and on returning to the Lodge sat down on a chair, off which she immediately fell to the floor dead.

The jury, of which Mr. William O'Sullivan was foreman, found that deceased's death was due to heart failure.

The sad demise of the deceased has caused much grief among all classes of the community and deep sympathy is expressed with her relatives.

A HORSE KILLED.

While the owner of a horse was leading the animal up William street yesterday a regrettable accident occurred. The horse, which was in for sale at the Great Munster Fair, suddenly swerved as a car was approaching and a shaft of the vehicle entered his chest, causing death shortly afterwards. The owner of the horse was, it is stated, after refusing a bid of £39, for the animal.

SAD BATHING FATALITY

Two Irish Policemen Drowned.

The Press Association Ballymena correspondent telegraphed yesterday—Two policemen, named Wallace and Donnelly drowned in the river Bann to-day.

The deceased, who were young men, stationed at Portlennone, were bathing, and got below their depth. They sank, and were carried away by a strong current.

Dragging operations were immediately commenced, but so far only one of the bodies been recovered. The occurrence has created considerable sensation in Portlennone district.

An inquest will be held.
