## MR. SAMUEL ON CLUBS.

Mr. Herbert Samuel, M.P., opening the  
 Northern Convalescent Home of the Club Union  
 at Saltburn-by-the-Sea said the club movement  
 had been subjected to much criticism. There  
 were many men in the House of Commons who,  
 if they had their way, would have taxed the clubs  
 not 6d. in the pound on intoxicants, but 100s.  
 in the pound. There were some bad clubs  
 which existed mainly for drinking purposes, and  
 which instead of being centres of en-  
 lightenment were centres of demoralization. The  
 campaign of the Government last year was not  
 directed against clubs of good character, but  
 those exceptionally evil clubs which were a blot  
 on their government, and which all present that  
 day would rejoice to see got rid of. But to  
 suggest, as some had suggested, that a large  
 proportion of working men's clubs in England  
 were institutions of that character and that they  
 were substitutes for the publichouse and of  
 co-operative drinking shops was a gross slander  
 upon the club movement. Clubs were the
