

BAD MANNERS AND REVOLUTION.

Christabel Pankhurst contributes to the number of "Votes for Women" and in reply to critics of the Suffragists' attack towards the Prime Minister at Lympne. Her statement that a police escort is to be ordered for Mr. Asquith wherever he may be arrested:—"Regrettable as it is that the Minister should adopt such undignified and manly methods of coping with our movement, his call for the help of the police is an encouragement to us, because it is a confession of weakness on his part. . . . We will not so much as listen to the plea that at a convention, a trivial question of manners should weigh heavier than the political liberty of the people. A sense of proportion alone should be enough to convince everyone that a bad law is a more serious evil than the temporary use of bad manners."
