**THE OLD-AGE PENSIONS  
ACT.**

The 41st report of the Deputy Keeper of the Public Records and Keeper of the State Papers in Ireland, which has been issued as a Blue book, contains an interesting reference to the Old-Age Pensions Act. The Act threw an amount of new work on the office which interrupted all the regular duties of the department which could admit of postponement. The public registration of births in Ireland only began in 1861, and no official source exists in the Irish Record Office from which evidence of birth can be furnished in the cases of persons 70 years old. The registers of baptisms of most of the parish churches of the former Established Church are in the office under the Public Records (Ireland) Amendment Act, 1875. But the registration of baptisms in other churches 70 years ago, in country districts, seems to be very defective. Fortunately the returns of the census taken in the years 1821, 1841, and 1851 are deposited in the office, and they are very largely availed of as evidence of age by the claimants for pensions.
