buoyant, with good business accordingly for sellers. Finished cattle were in most demand, the feature of the fair, perhaps, being the scarcity of sheep and the downward trend of prices, owing mainly, it was stated, to heavy imports of frozen mutton from abroad. Best beef sold at 60s per cwt, medium being round about 50s to 55s, and inferior touching down to 45s per cwt. Mutton was firm 5d to 6d per lb on foot. Three year old bullocks sold at from £15 10s to £17, and two year old do. £9 to £12. Three year old heifers realised from £13 to £15, and two year olds from £9 to £11. Yearlings fetched from £6 to £9 according to class, and milch cows and springers all prices from £12 to as high as £18. The general tone of the fair for stocks was good, and all the business was over early in the forenoon. Very few lots were left untouched.

DEATH OF MR. HENRY O'LEARY.

We regret extremely to record the death of Mr. Henry O'Leary, which occurred on Wednesday evening at his residence, Rathbane, at the early age of 28 years. The deceased was second son of the late Mr. Bernard O'Leary, who for 30 years, was connected with the firm of Messrs. Todd and Company, and for a considerable portion of that time was house superintendent. His son, Mr. Henry O'Leary had been for eleven years in the same firm, and held the important position of buyer in one of the departments.
