

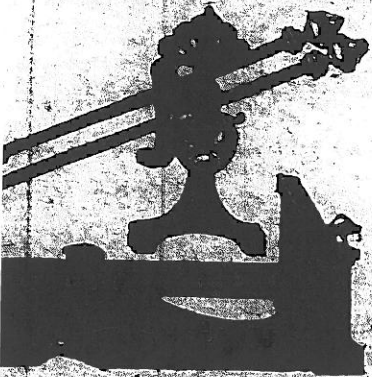

FUNERAL OF THE LATE
CAPTAIN O'BRIEN, R.N.

The funeral of the late Captain P. H. S. O'Brien, R.N., took place yesterday morning, leaving his late residence, Cratloe Woods, shortly after ten o'clock for the family burial place at St. Mary's Cathedral. The service was very large and representative of the people of Cratloe and the surrounding districts, whose the doings of this very popular, kindly-hearted, and unassuming gentleman, is universally regretted. Several members of the Board of Guardians, of which the deceased had been a member since 1898, attended with many of the officials. There was a very long line of vehicles, and immediately after the hearse marched the entire distance the labourers employed on the O'Brien estate.
