CHILD'S DEATH IN COUNTY LIMERICK.

Father Arrested.

A Kilmallock correspondent writes that John Hartnett, labourer, aged 40 years, residing in a cottage at Newtown, had been in the town of Hospital on Monday, and returned to his home that evening under the influence of drink. His wife proceeded to get him dinner, consisting of tea, etc., but he was dissatisfied, as it did not include meat. When she was about to put the teapot on the table, it is alleged that he knocked it out of her hand, and it fell on the child, aged 14 months, scalding it on the side of the head and neck, and inflicting a slight wound. Subsequently Hartnett was arrested for drunkenness and on the following day was charged with causing grievous bodily harm to the child, and remanded on bail to Petty Sessions.

Dr. Clery, Hospital, attended the child on the night it received the injuries, and subsequently, but it died on Wednesday night.

On Thursday, its father, John Hartnett, was arrested on the capital charge, brought before a magistrate, and remanded in custody.

At the inquest on the fourteen months' old child of John Hartnett, labourer, of Newtown, near Kilmallock, the jury found that death was due to acute oedema of the lungs, following extensive scalds of the face and neck, caused by the father knocking a pot of tea out of his wife's hands. The father has been remanded on the capital charge.
