the Irish Land Bill were considered. The Chief
 Secretary, moving one after another the adoption
 of those amendments, which were the result of

In the House of Commons yesterday the
 consideration was resumed of the Lords' amend-
 ments to the Irish Land Bill. On the clause
 setting up a Court to deal with questions arising
 out of compulsory purchase, the Attorney-
 General for Ireland said the Government
 thought that the tribunal should consist of the
 Judicial Committee, with, however, a right of
 appeal to the Court of Appeal on questions of
 law. Therefore, he moved to disagree with the
 Lords' amendment setting up a tribunal of three.
 On a division the Lords' amendment was nega-
 tive by 246 to 45. The remaining amendment
 was disposed of without discussion, and a
 committee was appointed to draw up reasons for
 disagreeing with the Lords' amendments.

 Rosbrien. Requiem Mass was celebrated for
 the dead in St Michael's R.C. Church at half-
 past ten, and immediately afterwards the funeral

 deceased lady was held in the city, and the deep
 sympathy which is felt with her family in their
 bereavement.
