At the meeting of the Standing Committee of the General Synod on Thursday, the Archbishop of Dublin presiding, the following resolution was passed—"That the Standing Committee of the General Synod of the Church of Ireland desire that an expression of their deep sympathy with the Lord Lieutenant and the Countess of Aberdeen in the sad bereavement that has fallen upon them in the death of their son, should be conveyed to their Excellencies, and that His Grace the Archbishop of Dublin be asked kindly to forward this resolution to their Excellencies."

### Limerick Sympathy.

The circumstances attending the tragic death of the Hon. Archibald Gordon, have evoked the greatest sympathy all over the country, and in no place more than the city of Limerick, whose freedom, his distinguished mother, the Countess of Aberdeen, received some years ago. Last evening the following telegram was despatched to her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen—"On behalf of the Corporation and citizens we offer the expression of our respectful sympathy on the death of your son. Signed, Thomas Donnellan (Mayor), William L. Stokes (High Sheriff), and William M. Nolan (Town Clerk).

The following reply, addressed to the Mayor, and handed in at Winchester, was received at the Town Hall at ten minutes past seven—"Her Excellency and I send most heartfelt thanks for the most kind message of sympathy which you and the High Sheriff and Town Clerk have sent on behalf of the Corporation and citizens of Limerick in regard to our great loss.—Aberdeen."

The Corporation, at their meeting on Thursday next, will pass a vote of condolence with the bereaved Earl and Countess in their great affliction.
