DISSOLUTION OF PARLIAMENT.

Royal Proclamation.

A special supplement to the London Gazette was issued last evening, containing the text of the Royal proclamation dissolving Parliament, and declaring the calling of another to meet on Tuesday, February 15. The Gazette also con-tained Royal proclamations commanding the Peers of Scotland to assemble at the Holyrood House, Edinburgh, on Friday, January 28th, to choose sixteen Scotch Peers to sit and vote in the House of Peers in the next Parliament, ordering the issue of writs for the new Parliament, dissolving the convocations of the Provinces of Canterbury and York, and ordering the issue of new writs.
