CORK CITY.

Mr. Wm. Redmond and Mr. O'Brien. Mr. Wm. Redmond, M.P., with Mr. P. Meehan, M.P., arrived in Cork on Saturday night to support the League candidates. They were escorted by a large crowd to the Victoria Hotel, through the windows of which speeches were delivered.

Mr. Redmond said it was nearly thirty years since he met Mr. O'Brien in the battle of Ireland's freedom. While Mr. O'Brien stood for a united Ireland, that he once preached, no man stood by him more loyally than he (Mr. Redmond) did; but he did not care who the man might be, if he were his own brother or father, if he tried to disunite Ireland he would oppose him, and would ask the people of Cork, in the name of God, to do likewise and let them fight the battle for the liberty of Ireland as a united body, and allow no personal feeling to perpetuate the curse of disunion again.

DEATH OF MR. J. KIVLEHAN.

It is with feelings of deep regret that we announce the death of Mr. John Kivlehan which took place at his mother's residence, 2 George street, on Sunday morning. The deceased young gentleman, who had just attained his thirtieth year, was only ailing a short time. Very few deaths have taken place in the city for some years that have occasioned such keen and poignant sorrow. Mr. Kivlehan was a universal favorite, the very embodiment of everything that made for popularity. Some four years ago, on the death of his father, the late Mr. John Kivlehan, he took a leading part in the management of an extensive business, and this scope was given for his business capabilities. He was thoroughly conversant with every side of his business, and his commercial activities were many sided. Always buoyant and full of gaiety, he was the soul of every social gathering of friends. There was ever a good word in his lips, and a cheery smile on his face, and now that he has passed away, his memory will ever remain green in the hearts of those who knew him intimately. To his sorrowing family the sympathy of the citizens will go out in this, the hour of their affliction, and in that sympathy we wish to join.

The Funeral.
