KING EDWARD IN PARIS.

Received by President Fallieres.

Paris, Tuesday.—President Fallieres received King Edward this morning. The two rulers cordially shook hands and conversed for half an hour, and the King then left.

Board of Trade Inquiry.

A Board of trade inquiry opened at Liverpool to-day into the loss of the Isle of Man steamer "Ellan Vannin," near Liverpool, last December, when thirty-six persons were drowned.

DEATH OF THE BISHOP OF LINCOLN.

Right Rev. Edward King, Bishop of Lincoln since 1885, passed peacefully away at 9.45 this morning. He was the oldest member of the Episcopal Bench, and during his tenure of the Bishopric Ritualistic practices at Lincoln caused his lordship to be tried before the Archbishop of Canterbury for non-conformity to the Rubric. The charges were dismissed, except two in which unjustifiable practices were ordered to be discontinued.

The Bishop of Lincoln had been unconscious since Sunday, and suffered no pain.

The funeral will probably take place at Lincoln Cathedral on Friday.

THE "SARACEN."
