The County Limerick Hunt Steeplechases took place yesterday at Crean, Fedamore, and were the most successful and enjoyable held by the members of this very popular Hunt for very many years. Ideal weather, summer-like in every respect, prevailed, and as such the attendance reached very large proportions. Throughout the day the sun shone out with wonderful brilliancy, and the fixture was patronized by the elite of the county and city.

The racing, which reached a very fine standard took place over a magnificent stretch of country, and there was nothing absent to conduce to a triumphant winding up of the season's sport. Visitors were hospitably entertained by the Executive, and down to the minutest detail everything was perfect. As is always the case at this re-union the arrangements were admirably effected. The Clerks of the Course, Messrs. J. O'Grady Delmege and T. Harding, had matters in such a way as that no one could cavil at, while the judging, starting, and scaling were entrusted to hands conversant with these duties. As Hon. Sec. Mr. John F. Power discharged the duties of that office with infinite credit, and was as usual affable and courteous to all. The fact was that everyone concerned in the fixture left nothing undone to make things as pleasant and enjoyable as possible, and in this task they were highly successful. The entries were exceptionally large, and the forty horses or so that took part in the four events were tested over a course which was splendidly laid out and afforded spectators a good view of the racing.

Four runners were saddled for the County Limerick Hunt Heavy Weight Race. The contest seemed at the mercy of Hederick, ridden by his owner, Mr. J. P. Hogan, who passed the post a long way in front of Grey Boy, who was awarded the race on an objection to Hederick for going the wrong course. The race for the Black Regimental Cup brought out nine candidates, and in all, except in two cases, owners were up, a fact which rendered the race interesting. The work throughout was cut out by Carry On, who went a bit out of his way half a mile from home. The running was then taken up by Maida Vale and Miss Perrier, who raced side by side to the final obstacle, when the last named came down but was at once remounted. The mare was, however, unable to get on terms with Maida Vale, who won by several lengths. The Heavy-Weight Cup was won by Rory O'More, the property of Mr. A. V. Holt, who had the mount himself. Eleven horses went to the post for the Hunt Light-Weight Race, and Fez, the property of Mr. A. E. Bannatyns, was always a hot favourite. After the start he went to the front, and making the pace lively he had a good lead before half the journey was traversed. Once he went out and having come into line again took up premier position being now closely attended by Hefty and Red Cross. At the road, the leader bolted and having been righted he went in pursuit of Hefty, Flithering Janey, and Red Cross. Between the last two banks he got on with his horses
