A man named Michael Burns, lately residing in Nenagh, and formerly of Inchicore, who was engaged as a shoemaker on the Great Southern Railway at Ballybrophy, was killed at Roscrea Station on Tuesday morning. How Burns got under the engine is not known.

The deceased travelled to Nenagh on the engine of the Mail train every morning and returned to Ballybrophy at night to work. He was in South Africa during the Boer War, and was an abstainer.

Council, took place on Tuesday from the residence of the lamented deceased, near Askeaton, the interment being in the family burial place at Kildimo.
