In addition to these, however, Cornelius Quilligan, P.L.G., and John Tierer, a former member of the Borough Council, were nominated, with the result that the election will have, unless there should be a change in the interim, six candidates to be voted on the polling day, Friday, 29th inst. At 4 o'clock this evening was the time limit for the withdrawal of nominations for the Market Ward vacancy. A little before this hour Mr. Tierer attended at the Town Clerk's Office to draw his candidature.

## DEATH OF MR. G. McELLIGOTT.

The death occurred on Saturday at his residence, Mount Rivers, Listowel, of Mr. Gerald McElligott, at the advanced age of 82. Mr. McElligott, who was one of the best known personalities in the Kingdom of Kerry, was also one of the oldest magistrates in the county, and an old Grand Juror. He was the founder of the firm of McElligott and Son, cattle and property salesmen. He was the first Chairman of the Commissioners of his native township, and at one time took an active part in local matters. As an agriculturist he obtained considerable reputation, especially as an authority on the making of butter, and on two occasions gave evidence in England on behalf of the Irish butter trade at prosecutions.

An Abbeyfeale correspondent writes:—The death of Mr. G. McElligott, of Listowel, was heard with sincere regret by the people of Abbeyfeale, amongst whom he has many friends. Amongst the general public here there was always only one opinion entertained of him, that of a gentleman of strict probity, whose wide business association was conducted with exceptional ability, with the ease of an extensive experience, and with a singular courtesy and honour—the best remembered of all his excellent qualities. It is not an exaggeration to say that few men of his class so thoroughly enjoyed the confidence and respectful esteem of the public in Kerry and West Limerick.

## ENNIS CHURCH.

Four stained glass windows have recently been erected in the above church—two in memory of Rev. J. H. Griffith, D.D., for over twenty-three years Rector of Ennis and Clare Abbey, and two in memory of four of his dearly loved children.

These windows are of original and unusual design, portraying incidents taken from the Old Testament. The first three illustrate "The Transmission of the Priesthood." The first window contains a large figure of Moses with the Tables of Stone in his hands, upon which the Commandments were written by the finger of God. On the panel beneath, the Ascent of Mount Hor by Moses, Aaron, and Eleazar is illustrated—Aaron to die there in obedience to God's command, and Moses to transfer the office and robes of the High Priest to Eleazar.

In the second window Aaron, the High Priest, is shown with breastplate, and Ephod bearing in his hand the roll of the law, and on the corresponding panel Moses is seen investing Eleazar with the garments of his father.

The third window contains a figure of Eleazar.

recovery. He lingered from ten to twenty minutes to one, when he died fully in the presence of his devoted family, whose great bereavement has the deepest sympathy of the citizens at large.

The deceased gentleman, who was 41 years, was son of the late Captain Darrean, Listowel, and early in life began of an active career. On leaving school he went to business, and so keen were his abilities that he was little more than 18 years of age when he was appointed representative of Tipperary, of Messrs. Fowler Brothers, Merchants, Liverpool. His residence in Liverpool brought him into close contact with men of wide and varied experience, who learned to appreciate his ability and zeal, and at the end of three years Stokes was offered and accepted the position of General Manager of the Co-Operative Society at Limerick. It goes without saying that onerous and responsible work with the utmost ability, efficiency, and success. During the thirty-seven years he has spent of the Society in Limerick, he has been eminently before the public, both as a promoter and as a promoter of athletic matters and as a promoter of athletic matters. Again, he was ever ready to help those in need, and his many acts of kindness and charity will be remembered. As a churchman he also took a prominent and most useful part in the affairs of the church. He was a member of the Select Vestry of the church for very many years, and Rector of the church. In addition he filled the offices of Nominator and Diocesan Synodsmen, and a member of the Diocesan Council of Education.

As a public representative, he has had a record of usefulness and zeal for the public good, which it is but the lot of few to attain. In the inception of the Local Government Act, Mr. Stokes was returned as one of the representatives of the Market Ward in the Corporation Council, a position which he retained until the date of his demise. In the administration of municipal affairs he showed a rare public spirit, as indeed he did in all his duties which he was called upon to perform for the Council chamber. He was universally respected, and no man of his capacity the city needed his services more than at that generous and prompt response which marked his life. In December, 1894, the death of Sir Thomas H. Cleeve, his successor in the Council showed their appreciation of Mr. Stokes by placing him first on the list to hold the exalted office of Mayor. His installation into that position was marked by expressions of goodwill and endearment from those who recommended him for the honor, and following January the members of the Council showed their confidence in him by reappointing him to the same office for the same term the case again this year. It is no exaggeration to say that in his keeping, the office of Mayor was a dignity, but was zealously maintained in the inheritance of a proud and honorable name. Mr. Stokes was also a member of the Education Committee, the Free School Committee, where he did splendid work, the City Distress Committee. His services as a payer had a trusted and faithful position on the Harbour Board, while in the Chamber of Commerce he was a member of force. He was a valued member and Vice-President of the Protestant Young Men's Association, and in his interests he always studied, and it was that in the Cricket and Tennis Club that he took a deep concern, not indeed, that all the Institution had not his kind sympathy.
