The minutes of the special meeting of the Council held on the 7th April for the purpose of striking the rate for the financial year ending 1911 showed that the rates decided upon to be levied were—Poor rate, 5s. in the £; town rate—town improvement rate, 1s. 7d. in the £; road maintenance, 1s. 7d.; sanitary, 1s. 2d.; water, 1s. 2d.; total rate, 5s. 6d., which, with 5s. poor rate, makes the entire rate 10s. 6d.

Mr. Cahir asked how did that rate compare with the rate of last year.

The Chairman replied that the total rate for last year was 11s. 1d.

A discussion followed, during which Mr. Capon said great credit was due to the Council to be able to strike a lower rate than last year.
